Business Courses

Registration will be coming soon. Please consider signing up for at least 1 business class. If you are interested in business as a career, you should take several.

Marketing 1: Marketing I should be the first choice for students with a career interest in business. Students will learn about the business world through fun and exciting hands-on activities and projects that encourage creativity and problem solving skills.

Sports Marketing: The one class where talking about sports is part of your grade! Students will examine the multi-billion dollar sports industry and examine the critical role corporate sponsorships play.

Fashion Merchandising: Fashion Merchandising introduces students to the business side of fashion. At the conclusion of the course, students will develop a plan for a clothing store including a logo, store layout, clothing designs, and marketing campaign.

Accounting 1: Students will develop skill beginning with an understanding of the basic elements and concepts of double-entry accounting systems. Skills will include a knowledge of the accounting cycle, entering transactions in journals, posting to ledgers, and compiling end-of-period worksheets.

Accounting 2: Students will develop advanced skills that build upon those acquired in Accounting I. Additional accounting skills such as reconciling uncollectible accounts, calculating depreciation on assets, interpreting financial information, and calculating notes and interest will be developed.

Taking Accounting 1 & 2 in the Junior or Senior year fill the 3rd year Math credit.

FIN 1050/Financial Literacy: Students interested in **Concurrent Enrollment** credit should enroll in this class. FIN 1050 will count as the Financial Lit graduation requirement. So if you are college bound you may as well earn college credit for a class you have to take in HS.

Webpage Design: A major emphasis is placed on the principles and design of a web site as well as advanced internet skills and techniques. HTML, web publishing and graphic editing software will be used to create, format, and edit web pages. 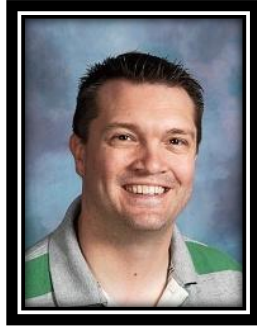

I like milk-chocolate, maintain that white chocolate really isn't, and love being a Silverwolf!



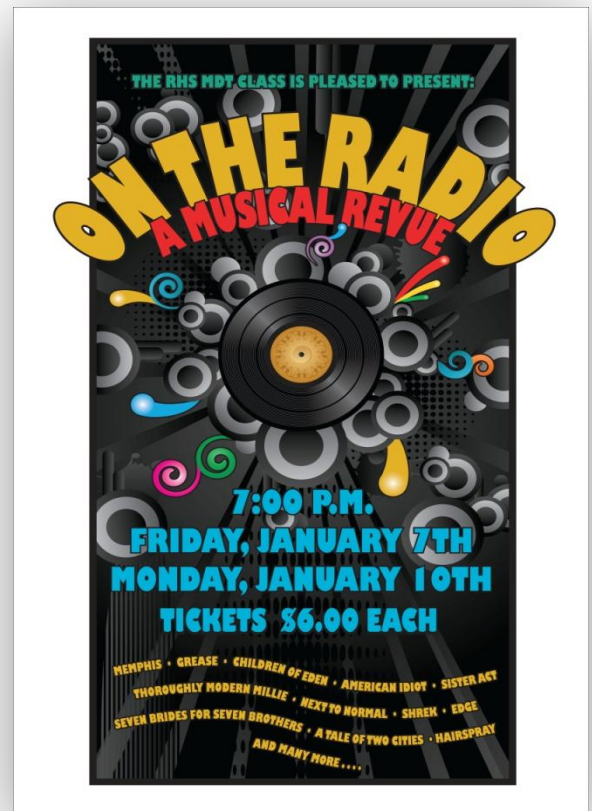

IF YOU WANT TO TAKE ONE OF THESE COURSES YOU MUST FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS BELOW:

- **ACT SCORES**
 - Students with qualifying ACT scores **MUST** come to the Career Center with their ACT scores in order to be enrolled in the class **by March 21, 2011**.
 - These students will then need to complete the application process for SLCC which will be given to them at the time they come down with their ACT scores.
- **CPT SCORES**
 - **The CPT test** will be given at Riverton High School on **March 28 – April 8** for students who do not meet the ACT score requirement or have not yet taken the ACT Test.
 - Students will be responsible for signing up for a test time in the Career Center by March 21.
 - **BEFORE TESTING, STUDENTS MUST ALSO BE ADMITTED TO SLCC.** They will receive the application process information when they sign up for their test time.
 - Students that have **PREVIOUSLY** taken a Concurrent Class from SLCC will **NOT** be required to re-apply. Students who are taking a class from SLCC for the first time will need to apply.

RANGES WILL BE HELD DAILY

It is important that we provide a safe, effective range instruction for our driver education students. The driving range is contained within the MAROON colored parking stalls in the northwest area of the large north parking lot. All other stalls on school property are painted yellow. Driver Education ranges are conducted almost every school day between 2:30-6:00 p.m. and Saturdays/school holidays throughout the year in the north parking lot. Students with valid parking stickers must remove their vehicles from the MAROON parking stalls immediately after school. Signs informing students and patrons of this policy are contained in the parking contract and are also posted on the range. Public address announcements are often made as a courtesy to students and patrons. *R.H.S. Dr. Ed. instructors do not enjoy calling tow trucks! However, if your vehicle is parked in a MAROON stall, it may get ticketed, towed, or even hit. Towing charges may cost you \$75-\$150!! Attendance Policy Clarification

Dear Parent/Guardian:

In order to clarify our attendance policy, please note the following:

If your student has a "NG" (no grade) for the current quarter it must be made up through the Attendance School by the end of the quarter in order to clear it up before report cards come out. One absence is \$3.00 and is one hour. One tardy is \$2.00 and a half an hour. If they do not complete this by the last day of the quarter, their report card will show a "NG" and the student will not be given credit for that class.

The student will STILL have an opportunity to make up the "NG". They will have until the end of the following quarter as the final deadline to make up a "NG". However, they will be required to attend double the time. In order for us to be able to offer double time for those students who didn't complete the makeup they needed, we must also charge for the extra time. Therefore, absences will still be \$3.00 per hour but two hours will be required. A tardy will still be \$2.00 per half hour but one hour will be required.

After that time, if the student has still not made up the required attendance school, he or she will be required to complete a packet in order to receive credit for that class. Packets are \$35.00.

THE DEADLINES FOR COMPLETING MAKE UP THIS YEAR ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1st quarter Oct. 29, 2010
- 2nd quarter Jan. 14, 2010
- 3rd quarter Mar. 26, 2010
- 4th quarter May 31, 2010

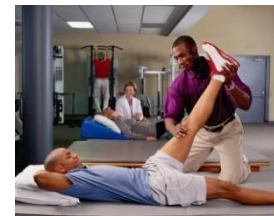
For example: If your student had a "NG" from 1st quarter, he or she had until Oct. 29, 2010 to make it up. If your student did not get it done by then, they now have until Jan. 14, 2010 to make it up. However, beginning third quarter it will be required to do two hours at \$3.00 per hour for an absence and one hour at \$2.00 per half hour for a tardy. If a "NG" from first quarter is not completed by Jan. 14, 2010 your student will have to purchase and complete a packet in order to receive credit for this class. This pattern will follow for the rest of the school year.

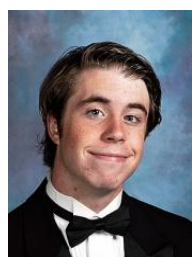
